
We had a great sense of pride and purpose. We collected and sorted so many bags of litter to help our community stay amazing.



Wednesday, April 2nd (Week 10) is World Autism Awareness Day. This global event has been celebrated since 2007 to raise awareness, acceptance, and appreciation of autistic people.

At Gordon Education Centre, we are dedicated to creating an inclusive environment where every student feels valued and supported. Our Autism Inclusion Teacher (AIT), Michelle Adams, promotes inclusion and diversity by sharing best practices and resources through the AIT initiative.

Promoting Autism Awareness



World Autism Awareness Day is April 2nd

Since 2007, the United Nations has observed this day to affirm the rights and freedoms of autistic people. Today we have moved beyond raising awareness to promoting acceptance and appreciation of autistic people and their contributions to society.

Below are some considerations around respectful ways to raise awareness and promote acceptance and appreciation. To be inclusive when referring to an autistic learner, you can understand and respect their identity by recognising their unique strengths and abilities. Celebrate and affirm your learner however they choose to identify. We have presented the preference of the majority of the autistic community, however we encourage you to use respectful curiosity to learn and affirm each individual preference.



The infinity symbol also represents neurodiversity and the infinite ways of being. It can symbolise the infinite potential and possibilities. The continual loop represents the continual need for support, understanding and acceptance.

We avoid using puzzle pieces as they can suggest that autism is puzzling, or needs to be solved, or that autistic people need to fit in.



We use rainbow or gold to represent autism. Rainbow represents the spectrum, diversity and that all colours are included. Gold

Rainbow represents the spectrum, diversity and that all colours are included. Gold represents value and worth. The chemical symbol for gold is Au. We avoide using blue, as it represents the stereotype that it's more common in boys. The 'light it up blue' campaign is associated with an American organisation that wanted to fix or cure autism. Many people in the autistic and autism communities avoid associating

with this.



Try using identity-first language and avoid diagnostic terms.

'Autistic student' is an example of identity-first language, versus 'student with autism'. Autism is a valuable and important part of someone's identity, which is why many people prefer to use identity-first rather than person-first language.

Try using terms such as 'autistic' and 'autism'. ASD is a diagnostic term. Unless you are specifically talking about a diagnosis, autism is not seen as a disorder. Similarly, we recognise that everyone's ability varies between every area of living. This is a dynamic view of functioning, versus describing someone as a high or low functioning autistic.



We are inclusive.

Attending education, having needs and engaging in interests is something that everybody has and does. Having a disability might make those things different, but not special. Inclusive education is a fundamental human right of all learners (UNCRPD, 2016).

LA1 have settled well into the school year. For literacy students have been completing activities around the texts ' Many Kinds of Dinosaurs " and 'Get In'. All are now accustomed to established routines including work around weekly sight words, writing, reading and word families ('ock' and 'et') under the Jane Farrall 'Literacy for All' program. In mathematics we have continued work on number, addition, subtraction, patterns and measurement. We have also continued learning about living/ nonliving things and tending to our potato plants which are growing nicely. In Geography we learnt about Australian states and cities and used various digital technologies across all subject areas. Students continue to enjoy their weekly swimming sessions and weekly cooking class (sausages, nuggets and chips).





This term is flying!! Who would believe we have already completed Week 6! There has been so many changes in such a short time too. The students in our class have been so amazing, with getting to know each other really well, settling into daily routines and expectations, and adapting to our move from LA10 to LA2. Their resilience to change is inspiring!

In class, we have been cooking a variety of yummy dishes such as Wraps with bacon, cooked onion, cheese and spinach; Pancakes with bacon, cooked banana, whipped cream and maple syrup; and Hot Dogs with bacon and cheese. Cooking has tied in nicely with our Numeracy lessons where we are learning about Number and Measurement.

We continue with swimming until (and including) Week 10 on Thursdays and go to Coles to buy the ingredients for our cooking on Wednesdays.

Over the last couple of weeks our students have enjoyed reading the text "Whose Teeth?" and opening the flaps to find the animals behind. We have also been talking about our teeth and identifying where they are on our bodies. For literacy we have also been focusing on the Letters Aa and Ee, how they are formed and where we might find these letters in lots of different places; in our names, in stories, animals/items starting with these as well as the sounds the letters make when we say them. We have been doing some fantastic writing using images of ourselves enjoying school activities or images of our favourite characters as writing prompts. In numeracy we have been sorting squares and triangles and focusing on the number 3. Swimming has been fun weekly and we are getting better at using the noodles and blowing bubbles in the water.
