From counting adventures to swimming splashes, our LA4 students have been busy exploring, creating, and connecting with their world in so many meaningful ways.

Technology time was all about switches! Children explored how different types of switches work.


Our students also began learning about money, money exchange and role playing by being customers in LA2's shop they created as part of their Learning Expedition.
